Agriculture is Montana's #1 industry!



Montana ranks #2 in the U.S. with land in farms and ranches - totaling nearly 59.8 million acres!

Montana farmers produce over 203 million bushels of wheat varieties for bread, pasta, cereals, animal feed, and more each year. Montana ranks as one of the top 5 wheat producing states in the U.S. Choteau County is the #3 overall wheat producing county in the U.S.

Montana's livestock inventory includes:
2,550,000 cattle
220,000 sheep
166,000 swine

Montana's top 5 cattle producing counties: Beaverhead, Fergus, Big Horn, Yellowstone, and Phillips. Beaverhead County is the #5 beef producing county in the U.S.

Pulse crops such as dry peas, dry beans, lentils, and garbanzo beans have been rising in production acres in Montana for the last several years. Dry peas made the top 5 commodity list for Montana in 2012, and production continues to grow. Montana now ranks as the #1 producer of lentils and dry edible peas, and the #3 producer of garbanzo beans in the U.S.

There are over 265,000 head of cattle and 17,000 head of horses on the 7 Indian reservations in our state. Total value of agricultural products sold on reservations in Montana by Indians was \$96,372,000. Indian owned farms produced over 435,000 tons of hay for feed and sales.



Approximately 6% of Montana farms and ranchlands are owned by Indians, both on and off reservations.

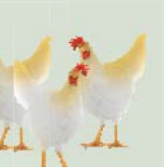

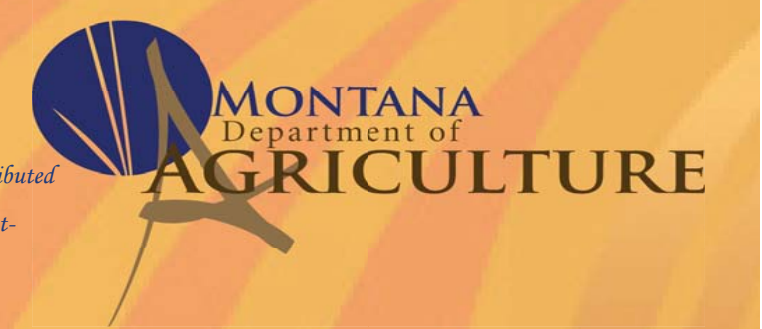
